To celebrate this milestone Members and supporters of the theatre will be invited to a Gala Opening on 8th April for a special production of the hit play, The Rise and Fall of Little grounds. It will shortly be relocated to the right side of the Voice. Public performances will follow from 9th to 12th April chancel arch with the other war memorials. During the dark days of closure we kept the theatre group going by touring in village halls and schools in the Newark area for seven years, finishing with a sell-out production of 'Allo 'Allo at Farndon Memorial Hall in January. We have been so pleased that our audiences have followed us around the County. Many of our current actors and technical crew have not had the joy of working in the theatre and are looking forward to it.

Touring has needed extra effort in every production as we had to move everything including scenery, costumes, props, chairs, curtains to adapt the building for our production, as well as having to find and pay for places to rehearse and hold meetings. We are very excited and relieved to see an end to this and be back in our beloved theatre again.

We will not give up the touring experience as we have developed new skills and found creative ideas that we would not have thought of in the theatre. Also many of the venues we visited were so welcoming and keen to see us that we will be back with some smaller scale productions as part of the season.

Although opening in April, the whole building won't be finished for some time. Fund raising continues to complete the full theatre facilities, not only for our own activities, but also to offer facilities for local schools, other touring companies, exhibitions and venue hire for local residents and societies.

Having a permanent home also means that we can start to plan for the re-establishment of the Robin Hood Youth Theatre. More on that once we are really back in and started.

For now we look forward to welcoming you all back to our enhanced theatre in April. Jackie Rogers

I feel that I need to reply to the article published in the Plough last month.

I was born in Pinfold Lane and have lived here all my life. Our home is opposite the Village Bake House, which is the name it's been called all of my lifetime. I have never known it as The Sunday Oven. The Bread Oven is a name that it has been referred to recently.

During the war, when the village had evacuees. The then head teacher Mrs Spurs and some of the other villagers decided to form a pig club. Mrs Spurs who lived in Little Hollies as it is now called, owned all the land down to the end of the Pinfold path, it was a field then. They decided to build some pigsties and the village bake house was used to turn left over food into swill for the pigs.



The Pinfold went from the main A617 to the end of the footpath where the new semi detached houses are built. From there to the end of the lane was known as Blacksmith Lane with the forge on the corner. It was renamed Pinfold Lane in 1960.

Our deadline for receipt of all oil orders is by noon on the Tuesday before the buying date. Please note: Next deadlines for ordering from co-ordinator are Monday 17th March, Friday 11th April..

Deliveries are usually made 5-7 days after ordering. Those not on email fill in a form and send it back to your local coordinator John Wolfenden Telephone: 01636 672 990 or email thewolfos@hotmail.com

Your co-ordinator will let RCAN know who, from your village, wants to order oil and how much you all want.

After RCAN have negotiated the very best possible price, your This appointment will mean a large change for our Benefice. It co-ordinator will contact you to tell you approximately when is with hope and optimism, after many years, we can look forthe delivery will be made (for example, 'in the week beginning 3rd') and how much the oil will cost.



Then it's over to you. Only if you have indicated on your membership form that you need to be present for delivery, will the oil supplier get in touch with you directly to confirm the delivery date and time. Otherwise oil will be delivered to you in the usual way. In the unlikely event that there

is a problem with your delivery, please make sure the coordinator knows as soon as possible. You pay the oil supplier in the normal way.

The member's price for January was 51.75 pence per litre which was a lot cheaper that the internet price at the time.

Revd. Colin Wall Appointed as Riverside Benefice Vicar

It was with great joy on Sunday 26th January that we were able to announce that the churches of the Riverside Benefice have been assigned a new parish priest. For much of the past ten years we have been blessed to receive ministry from our local retired clergy and reader. They have performed above and beyond the call of duty and ensured that services have continued in Averham, Kelham, North Muskham and South Muskham. This has not just been the regular, fortnightly services but also baptisms, blessings, weddings and funerals. For this and their pastoral guidance we thank you all.

The lack of a parish priest has meant that all of the congregations and the wider village communities have lacked a spiritual focal point of reference. At times I know that we all have found it difficult to be inspired and motivated without this leadership.

Well, soon after Christmas, it seemed that our prayers may well have been answered. An application had been received for the vacancy in the Riverside Parishes. With upmost speed, an informal look around the four churches was organised. This went well and the following week a formal interview took place in the Diocesan offices. This was led by Archdeacon David Picken, with all of the four churches being represented. This also went very well, the Riverside Benefice wanted Colin and he wanted to come and work with us. I will not include details here of Colin's background as he will tell us his own story in the April edition of the Plough magazine.

The position is "house for duty" and this means that Colin will be working three days a week for the Benefice. This will be Sunday and two other days, the details will be worked out nearer the time. Due to Colin having to hand over his responsibilities in Tuxford, it appears that the likely "Licensing Service" will happen at the end of August in Kelham church.

So, for the coming months the retired clergy will continue to lead our services, but planning meetings for later in the year will include Colin. There will still be times when the retired clergy will take services, but it is hoped that they will shortly be able to enjoy a reduction in commitments and be able to spend more time with family and friends.




The Christingle service in St Andrew's Church, Caunton with our 3KANDO colleagues and peers was a lovely and spiritual event, enjoyed by all.

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It's Good to Get Back in the Garden

One day of sunshine does not a spring make? But still it was really good to get some time in the garden with Finn, with less rain & some breezy days the soil is drying out, the path across my lawn is less of a muddy stream, more of a soft dry brown river bed...

Finn & I have started on the vegetable / salad plot, a raised bed which hasn't been at its best over the last couple of years, lacking body & nourishment, on having a good dig we find it's pretty full of tree roots. We have some lovely but massive poplars along the edge of the garden, they are good for wild life, give great shelter but the roots are a pain.

The recovery plan is to dig all of the good soil out, put a membrane down to allow water through but no roots, then re-fill with the soil, some farmyard manure & fertilizer. Sounds good? But It could take a while! Well we enjoyed a good dig, made a good start, discussed the ins & outs of Minecraft at length & then got distracted by the Rugby!

Well, we have until mid March before we can start sowing & planting, no point in starting too soon or things just get cold & stop growing. We have some spuds set up to chit & these Finn will plant in tubs, so they come out all nice & clean, we just do a few earlies Suttons Foremost & maybe the salad potato Charlotte.

Looking around there is plenty to tackle even if you ignore the fallen tree (one of those massive poplars which fortunately just missed the bedroom!) which I will leave for Paul, the chainsaw expert. - Confirm the identity of anyone who calls at your home sure? Don't open the door.
